October also saw our school community donate a significant amount of food for our Harvest Festival. To celebrate the occasion each class presented something related to the Harvest, which saw students singing, acting and showcasing their artistic skills (some shown in the left picture). Following this assembly, our Year 6 pupils delivered the collected food to some of our local community. I really believe that our children being able to independently and personally support their local community brings an even deeper purpose to this event and promotes values that will be lifelong. I would like to thank everyone who donated and supported our festival.

In the last week of Term 1 we saw the launch of a new initiative, Learning Conferences. I would like to thank all our pupils, parents and staff for embracing this new idea with such commitment and openness. The benefits of being a small but risk-taking community cannot be underestimated and it pleases me to see us remaining on the cutting edge of education. The feedback levels from parents were huge and I

will explore this in detail in a separate letter. Headline information, from the 112 responses, showed that in terms of our core purpose (seeing children develop reflections and plan future learning) an average of 8.2 (on a scale of 1-10) felt this was achieved, which is very positive and shows true impact. Furthermore, 70% of the responses wanted to see Learning Conference continue at Capel. This number jumped significantly considering families when wanting a mixture of Parent Consultations and Learning Conferences. A few key positives were noted as pupil confidence, relationship with teachers, pupil led approach resulting in pupil action and support of developing lifelong 'interviewing' skills. Some points for consideration were time, ability to raise 'sensitive' issues and capacity for deep assessment discussions. I will collate responses and share a more detailed, subsequent letter with you in due course. Once again, thank you for engaging in such a new and unique approach, which clearly benefited our students.

Finally, I want to congratulate all the students who partook in the Kent 11+ (PESE tests) this year. Earlier this month they received their results and I am pleased to share that 10 of the 15 students who took the test passed. This is the highest pass rate for Capel Primary School. For those that were unsuccessful, I would like to remind them that no test will ever define them and that as long as they did their best then they should be proud of themselves. Year 6 families need to select their Secondary School by the end of the day and I hope they all get their first choices!

I would again like to thank all our community for your on-going support and I hope November is filled full of new, meaningful learning experiences for your children. As always, please feel free to use our open door policy to share any concerns or successes so we can continue to develop our community.

The main focus of the visit was the World War 2 tunnels, which have been used to present information about Operation Dynamo. The children have told me how they listened to key speeches, analysed war plans, questioned the role of Sir Winston Leonard Spencer Churchill and saw the weaponry used before exploring the consequences of Operation Dynamo and Dunkirk. This topic always inspires our students and it is amazing to see them developing a true understanding of how the past shapes life today!
